Land Use:

Starts at 29 corridor as commercial use, then residential use along Polo Grounds Rd, next is open space, and then Penn Park & Darden Towe Park.

Wildlife Sightings and Plant Life:

Turtles, Smaller Fish, 1 Eagle, Geese, 3 Osprey, 2 Kingfishers, 1 Blue Heron, 1 River Otter, Crow. Many downed trees still, but none were major safety concerns, as the majority of them were off to the side or just hanging out into the river. Some underwater vegetation growing near the 29 bridge, and a dense patch of bamboo just below Darden Towe Park at river right. A few brightly colored flowering plants also along the banks.

People Interactions:

I was joined on the paddle today by Willy Kjellstrom and Chris Stanek from Albemarle County Public Schools, whom I have been working with on educations programs related to their students building and deploying stream and river sensors for the Rivanna Watershed. Rivanna River Company provided us with the kayaks and shuttle for today's paddle. There were numerous people out in the river today fishing, kayaking, canoeing, swimming, or tubing. Several people on the trails along the river as well, and several dogs cooling off in the river.



Litter and Pollution:

Collected 1 large bag of smaller trash, a tire, an inflatable raft, 2 soccer balls, and a kayak paddle today from the river. There were several larger objects found as well, including tires, lawn furniture, 2 recycling bin lids, a large sheet metal object, a large metal object buried in one of the beaches at Darden Towe, a long pipe, broken pieces of concrete, and the same railroad bridge debris mentioned in previous reports.

Overall Summary:

We lucked out with the weather and water levels today that made for a great paddle. The water was a clear as I have seen it in months, and there was a lot of great wildlife out today. Good to see so many people out enjoying the Rivanna River in various ways. There are still a lot of debris piles, downed trees, and eroded banks due to recent floods. We ended the paddle at the Rivanna River Company boat dock.

Actions Needed – level of priority (1 highest/5 lowest):

3 – Remove larger items (railroad scrap, sheet metal, buried metal object at Darden beach, furniture, pipe, concrete)
