Land Use:

Beaver Creek Reservoir and Park is owned and managed by the County of Albemarle. The area surrounding the water is wooded with trails, presumably for fisherman. The Albemarle County schools and local rowing club operate on this reservoir as well.

Wildlife Sightings and Plant Life:

Largemouth bass, bluegill, turtles, American trumpet vine, blackberry, herons, button bush and gallinules

People Interactions:

There were several family groups on the water today. We talked with several fishermen who said they caught largemouth and perch. The majority of boaters were on SUPs, paddling and tanning.

Litter and Pollution:

A few trash items were found but not much.

Overall Summary:



This park is a great outdoor resource to the western part of the county and beyond. The formal dock for boat access is well maintained with many other informal places near the parking lot to access the water as well. We saw families scattered along the grassy shoreline, mostly fishing.

The overall size of the reservoir allows for a relatively large amount of community members to enjoy the water without being on top of one another, this is especially important during the pandemic. The reservoir is relatively open with a few little cove areas that provide shade and habitat. There were plenty of largemouth bass and blue gill seen in the downed trees and shoreline grasses.
